Co-Chairs of Local Governors, Vicki Worsnop and Ursula Love - A Model to Consider

As the responsibilities of Local Governing Bodies (LGBs) develop, co-chairing provides many advantages for governors, schools, and Trusts. At St. Laurence Catholic Primary School, we took on the role of co-chairs in September 2024. We had been on the LGB for a number of years, so we had the advantage of knowing each other and already working together as governors.

Our first action before our September start was to produce a table of responsibilities so that together we agreed our individual responsibilities, had clear role definitions, and knew where our roles overlapped. We have complimentary skills and abilities, and this became evident as we compiled our table. It was also important to recognise flexibility in our co-chair roles. We shared our table of responsibilities with the Headteacher to ensure that she was happy with our model.

As co-chairs, we agreed that we meet regularly in person every two weeks, usually the day before we met with the Headteacher. This enables us to agree an agenda for our meeting with the Headteacher and to identify any issues that we feel need to be discussed with her. As co-chairs we also communicate via WhatsApp regarding any aspect of governance.

There are challenges to co-chairing but with a clear table of responsibilities, regular meetings, honest communication, and mutual trust, it is a model that works exceptionally well for us, our LGB and for the school and Trust.

Forewarned is forearmed so we were aware of potential challenges for us as cochairs:

- · Co-ordination issues can cause confusion, delay in decision making and communication breakdown
- · Decision-making delays co-chairing requires consensus, which can slow decision-making and responsiveness, making it challenging to address urgent issues or opportunities.

Thankfully, we have not had to deal with these potential difficulties because we agreed our responsibilities and roles from the start and set up our regular meeting times.

From our perspective, the advantages of co-chairing far outweigh the possible negatives. The advantages we have seen include:

- · An added focus on governance practices
- · A second perspective on working with other locak governors
- · Better decision making co-chairing provides boards with access to broader perspectives. With two people contributing different experiences and perspectives, decisions are tested more thoroughly and bias can be recognised and avoided
- · The ability to compliment one another's skills
- · Shared responsibility and accountability
- · Continuity, resilience, and succession planning a co-chairing model helps boards maintain continuity. If one chair steps away, whether temporarily or permanently, the other can maintain stability, reducing disruption and helping the board stay on course
- · A more manageable workload for the two people in role

Our experience of co-chairing enables leadership to be more balanced and sustainable. It has brought flexibility, can ease pressure, improve governance, and support succession, without placing the burden on a single person working as all our governors do in a voluntary capacity. It is certainly a model worth considering as we come back to the start of the new school year.

Introducing Our Trust Staff Charter: A Commitment to Wellbeing - Jo Berry, Headteacher, St Marys

We are delighted to share that, as a group of schools, we have developed a Staff Charter that sets out our clear commitments to support and enhance the wellbeing, work life balance and mental health of everyone working in our Trust.

Leaders from across Trust primary and secondary schools met first to discuss and shape the charter. They then took these initial ideas back to their wider teams in school, where further dis-



cussion and collaboration took place. After gathering feedback and refining the commitments, we agreed on a final Staff Charter that we believe truly reflects the Catholic ethos and values underpinning our Trust schools.

Our Staff Charter is more than words on a page; it is a promise to create a culture of care, respect, and support for every colleague based on our shared Catholic values and ethos. We look forward to working together to continue to make these commitments the lived reality in all our schools.

Trust SEND Conference June 2025 - Caroline Clarke, Trust Lead SENDCo

On June 10th 2025 Our Lady of Walsingham Catholic MAT hosted our very first SEND Conference at Meadows Community Centre in Cambridge. There were 20 delegates including SENDCos, Headteachers and Inclusion Leads from Trust schools, schools in the St John the Baptist Catholic MAT and a range of Cambridgeshire schools.



We were delighted to welcome an excellent range of speakers who presented on an exciting range of topics. Abigail Hawkins, known and recognised nationally as 'Sensible SENCo', opened the Conference by sharing her ideas for measuring and mapping the progress of pupils with SEND, looking in particular at the GAS Model. All delegates received a free copy of her book, 'Approach it, Map it, Manage it' for further reading.

Our second keynote speaker, Amy Moore, SEND Consultant for Reed and ADHD Ambassador, talked with honesty and openness about her journey through school and into adulthood, as a person with undiagnosed neurodiversity. At 24 years old Amy was finally diagnosed with ADHD and it was a privilege to hear first hand how it feels from her perspective and all that she has achieved.

After lunch delegates attended two workshops of their choice. Speakers included Emma Ferris, Specialist SALT from Communicate who talked about receptive language difficulties and behaviour problems, Tom Emmett, Education Law Associate, who talked about a range of topics including Consultations and Tribunals and Jenny McGhee Wallace, Executive Headteacher from OLOW, who spoke about one school's journey of harnessing the power of consistency, kindness, and adult authority in shaping student behaviour.

There were also opportunities to network with colleagues throughout the day and to browse the trade stands provided by Reed Education and Communicate.

We have received very positive feedback from attendees who rated all speakers very highly and said that there were lots of practical ideas and tips shared that they could take away and use straightaway back in their schools.

An enormous thank you to all our speakers and delegates for making it such an exciting, interesting and worthwhile event. Huge thanks must also go to schools for allowing staff to attend the conference and the administrative support that enabled me to organise such a successful day. We look forward to organising similar events in the future.



Parents and carers were warmly welcomed to view the exhibition and were impressed by the quality of the children's work. Many took the opportunity to purchase their child's artwork.


Thank you to all the staff, children, and families who produced work for and attended the event. The pride on the children's faces as they shared their work was priceless.

Across the year pupils have learnt about the importance of doors during the Jubilee of Hope and that crossing the threshold symbolises entry into a new life in Christ and the beginning of a journey of conversion.

On Christmas Eve, Pope Francis said,

"The steps of our journey are the steps of the whole church, pilgrims in the world and witness of peace".

At the end of the Spring term, during our Lenten Pilgrimage, the pupils took part in imaginative prayer and considered who they felt close to. Each child created a picture of someone important to them that they wished to bring closer to Christ. These were collated into class banners for our Pentecost Procession. We have been careful to forge links across the year between our acts of worship for the Pilgrimage of Hope to ensure formation has been woven throughout.

Starting our service in the school hall, the school gathered together to remind themselves of why Pentecost was important and the apostolic mission we live out in our daily lives. Having led the prayers, Father John then led the procession. Each class proudly carried their banner during our walk to church where we had the second part of our service and were joined by members of the parish.

The pledge and the service were co-produced with the pupils. They relished the chance to sing the hymns they had chosen and the junior chaplains read out the pledge which the school has committed to:

- Listening and tracking people who talk to us, particularly when they ask for our help
- Reducing our carbon footprint and the amount of waste we produce
- Supporting Cafod fundraising and increasing our donations
- Creating new school traditions which protect our school environment for future pupils

The Caritas Group

"The Caritas group is made up of pupils in Years 3, 4, 5 and 6. In this year of Jubilee, the group has looked at how our school can be more active in living our faith and in following Pope Francis's call to do something special for others and for our world.

So far, we have raised over £300, through a non-uniform day at school and through individual members of the Caritas group organising jewellery sales and cake sales, to pay for a tree to be planted in Cambridge as part of the "Trees for Streets" scheme. The tree will be planted on Lammas Land or Coe Fen in the Autumn.

We are now planning to raise money to create a grotto for Our Lady in the playground. This will act as a place for prayer and reflection for the school and a focus of prayer on special feast days for both the school and the parish of OLEM.

We have received postcards and letters from another Catholic primary school in Bristol and we will be replying to them this term.

The school was already actively supporting the Cambridge Foodbank and CAFOD fund-raising initiatives and we are making sure we continue to do this as part of our Jubilee focus on helping others.

On the theme of pilgrimage, we have updated the "Footprints of Faith" walk, which was written around 10 years ago. It follows in the footsteps of important Catholic figures in the history of Cambridge and in our Catholic heritage eg St John Fisher, Lady Margaret Beaufort and Baron von Hugel.

We will be making these pilgrimage walks later this year and hope they will become a regular part of St Alban's Catholic life.

Year 12 Geographers at Ipswich Waterfront Road

During May our Year 12 Geography students had the opportunity to visit Ipswich Waterfront and Woodbridge Road. This formed part of our local case study for our Changing Places unit, we compared this data to Brick Lane in London which we visited in March.



As we walked down Woodbridge Road we investigated the exogenous factors that had affected the area- we collected non participant observations, traffic counts and interviewed shop keepers. Our students were praised by the local community for their politeness and interest in the area. We completed similar data collection at Ipswich Waterfront but also categorised the street art.

Spirit Yachts careers visit for Year 12

On the 6th June Year 12 Product Design students had a fantastic opportunity to visit a luxury boat builder in Ipswich, Spirit Yachts. Students were taken around the entire boat yard and shown every single stage of designing and manufacturing all the individual wooden components of the bespoke yachts.



Students were allowed to see up close the tools, equipment and processes that are used to fabricate every part of the wooden yachts, from shaping and joining the internal rib structure to layer after layer of varnish that the yachts need before commissioning.

Natalie, our guide, was extremely knowledgeable and delivered detailed information on every aspect of manufacture alongside information about careers within the boat building industry.

Due to the confidentiality, they produce boats for high profile clients and film's such as James Bond, we were not allowed to take any photos of the yachts during construction.

Thank you to Miss Tooke and Mr Clarke for arranging this inspiring opportunity for students.




The Big Tea Break - Raising Money for EACH
